HHGS NEWS 2022

In the early spring and summer HHGS had stands at **Eastcote** High Street 'Family Food Day', **Ickenham** Festival and **Eastcote House Gardens** 'Jubilee Picnic', where we were glad to meet enthusiastic and interested members of the public. (*Eastcote House Gardens*)

The HHGS members on the **Brecon Beacons** weekend field trip in May had fair weather to visit localities in Palaeozoic rocks ranging from the Silurian through the Old Red Sandstone to the Upper Carboniferous Coal Measures, and industrial archaeology sites in the **Fforest Fawr Geopark**. There was also an excellent display at the **National Museum in Cardiff** on 'The Evolution of Wales'. (*Fforest Fawr | UNESCO Global Geopark (fforestfawrgeopark.org.uk)*)

During the spring and summer HHGS followed a theme of 'Local Rivers', which involved evening Zoom talks and daytime walks to visit the **Colne Valley** rivers:-

- A walk in Ruislip Woods and Pinn Meadows led by Graeme Shaw and John Scrivens (RWMAG).
- 'The Geology and Hydrology of Ruislip Woods,' site report by Allan Wheeler followed by discussion of flood management in Park Wood in Pinn Meadows. <u>PowerPoint Presentation</u> (<u>hhgs.org.uk</u>)
- A sunny visit, including some members we haven't seen for awhile, to the newly-landscaped water management scheme at Headstone Manor Park to see the completed restoration works near the source of Yeading Brook. Dr Phil Collins (Brunel University) attended the walk and gave an excellent talk in the evening on 'Floods past, present and future'. (<u>Headstone Manor Park Project Headstone Manor Museum</u>)
- **Dowding Park**, Uxbridge, daytime walk (starting at Uxbridge Battle of Britain Bunker Museum) to explore part of the **River Pinn**.
- The **'Pleistocene Thames**,' taking in the gravel terraces laid down by the Thames in the Harrow and Hillingdon area, Zoom talk by Peter Allen.
- Harrow Weald Common walk, starting with a social meeting at Squire's Garden Centre café. It was a beautiful day and a very pleasant walk to explore the local gravels. The geological SSSI is the fenced-off site of an old quarry excavation where gravel has been removed. There was a wonderful view from the top, looking across to Harrow and Heathrow, plus the source of the **River Pinn**.

In June Dr Haydon Bailey (Herts.GS) led us on a joint trip with Reading GS, to look at the **Chiltern Chalk**. It was an excellent trip, **College Lake** had a very good exposure with a panel explaining it. While we were there a Curry Fund Plaque was awarded to Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust for cleaning up the exposure. The **Dunstable Downs** ridge gave a very good view of the Vale of Aylesbury, and in the **Kensworth Quarry** nature reserve, on the way to look at the Chalk Rock exposure, we saw many different types of orchid.

The Members' Walk and Social, '**Central Harrow Building Stones Walk'** led by Allan was well attended. We received new information about stones used for the plaza market area from the architect. Of interest was the Portuguese granite in the Greenhill area, which looks similar to Bodmin Moor granite. *Habib Bank A G Zurich* welcomed us in and we took photos of their marble floor. They said all the marble was Italian. The tour guide will soon be available on our website.



FIELD TRIPS 2022/23

Allan Wheeler, our Field Trip Organizer, is researching our field trips for the coming year or so. They will include outdoor exploration, building stone town trails and museum visits (following government Covid-19 guidelines, should they be re-imposed). Further information will be emailed out once any field trips are agreed, and details about the trips will be available on the website or from Allan. We try to share cars or use public transport as much as possible to reduce costs and damage to the environment. On field trips we take photos, leave only footprints and collect only loose specimens for educational or personal use where it is environmentally safe to do so. Trips under consideration include weekend visits to the **Suffolk, The Black Country,** and repeats of the Society's earliest field trips to mark our 50th anniversary in 2023. A day at the **Maidstone Museum** is also planned, postponed from 2020. In addition, visits are proposed to **Coldfall Wood** near Finchley, a locality marking the southernmost extent in England that a Pleistocene ice sheet has reached, and **Newlands Corner (Surrey)**, a locality well-known in SE England for the effect of geology on the landscape.
